THE RIGHTS OF NATURE: A GLOBAL MOVEMENT

As pressures on ecosystems mount and as conventional laws seem increasingly inadequate to address environmental degradation, communities, cities, regions and countries around the world are turning to a new legal strategy known as The Rights of Nature. This film takes viewers on a journey that explores the more recent origins of this legal concept, and its application and implementation in Ecuador, New Zealand, and the United States.

GREENHOUSE BY JOOST

Imagine a house that grows its own food. That's the vision of environmental campaigner Joost Bakker. This inspiring feature documentary, filmed in Melbourne, follows Bakker as he builds a self-sustaining home, an ecosystem that provides its occupants with water, energy, shelter and nourishment. Joined in his work by internationally acclaimed chefs Matt Stone and Jo Barrett, Bakker faces his fair share of challenges to finish the home. Bureaucratic delays, COVID shutdowns and blackouts all threaten the build. But ultimately, Greenhouse is an uplifting look at the teamwork and ingenuity behind a paradigm-shifting project that bursts with life.

THE GIANTS

110 mins. Australia 2022. Dir: Rachel Antony & Laurence Billiet

A poetic, cinematic portrait of Bob Brown, the Forest, and of our profound connection with trees. The Giants explores the intertwined fates of trees and humans in this cinematic portrait of environmental folk hero Bob Brown who took green politics to the centre of power. From a seedling to forest elder The Giants interweaves Bob's story with the life cycle of the ancient trees he is fighting for. The hidden life of the forest is brought to life by cameras rigged high in the tree canopy. Drawing on Bob's lifetime of activism, from the Franklin to the Tarkine, The Giants ignites an urgent conversation about the right of the Forest to exist and challenges the audience to write the next chapter.
